Molecular characterization of *Haemophilus influenzae* virulence factors

Abstract: *Haemophilus influenzae* is a Gram-negative microorganism, pathogenic for human, causing both localized respiratory tract and systemic (invasive) disease. The initial step in the pathogenesis of disease involves colonization of the nasopharynx. To facilitate colonization, *H. influenzae* elaborates both pilus and non-pilus adhesins. To come in and survive in deeper host tissues bacterium produces a lot of other virulence factors that interfere with host defence mechanisms or make possible to gain required nutrient ingredients. Because of naturally competence for DNA uptake from environment a lot of virulence factors were acquired through horizontal transfer and are the pathogenicity islands. This article presents major virulence factors of *H. influenzae*, their regulation systems and mechanisms of changeability.
